#### **Providing Ongoing Reading Intervention**

At the end of this year, the Reading Recovery Program will no longer be available in Canada. Reading Recovery was an intensive 1:1 reading intervention program for grade 1 students who were struggling. Learning Services has been working on a new intervention program that will exploit the skills of our trained teachers to provide 1:1 as well as small group instruction and intervention to students and classrooms in grades 1-3. It will be implemented this September.

## Within Each Pathway...

The multiple pathways will be short-term, and the length will be determined through a decision making process with Administration, the SBT & District Early Literacy Intervention Teacher:

**Tier 1: Strong classroom instruction by classroom teacher**

This can include Early Literacy Teacher supporting Classroom teacher with planning for in-class support

**Tier 2: Targeted small-group interventions**

Group size: 3-5 students  
Frequency: 3-5 days/week  
Duration: 20-30 minutes

**Tier 3: Target individualized intervention**


Group size: 1:1 or very small group (1-2 students)  
Frequency: 5 days/week  
Duration: 20-30 minutes

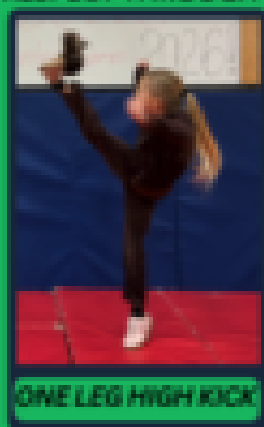
## 6TH ANNUAL ARCTIC WINTER GAMES AT DUNCAN CRAN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

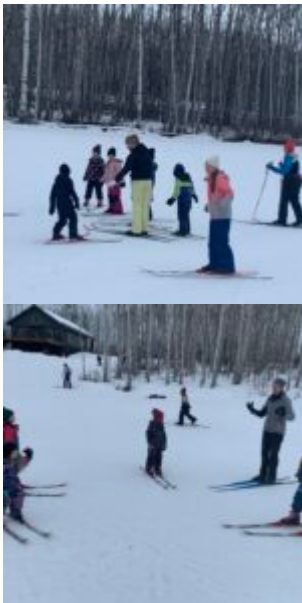
All six stations are activities that you would find within Inuit communities and Inuit games.
