Literacy Screening

Beginning in the 2026-2027 school year, districts will be required to expand their early literacy screening practices to include all students from kindergarten to Grade 3.

Early literacy screening is one of the ways we will make meaningful progress on literacy outcomes for students in our K-12 system. By ensuring all public school students are screened in K-3, schools will be able to identify students who may have difficulty reading and provide the targeted instruction and interventions they need to become proficient readers.

Supporting Competency-Based Learning with SpacesEDU: Showcasing Growth Over Time

This year, Anne Roberts Young Elementary, Bert Ambrose Elementary, Margaret Ma Murray Community School, and Taylor Elementary are participating in our district's SpacesEDU pilot. We are excited to explore how the platform can support competency-based learning by helping students document, reflect on, and demonstrate their growth over time. SpacesEDU also supports assessment, student reflection, and communication with families, and we hope the experience will be positive for staff, students, and families.

Within a secure digital space, students can share photos, videos, audio recordings, documents, and written reflections that demonstrate their learning. Whether students are explaining their mathematical thinking, documenting a science investigation, showcasing a piece of writing, or reflecting on a Core Competency, SpacesEDU creates a rich digital portfolio that highlights growth and competency development over time.

The platform supports the triangulation of assessment by allowing teachers to gather evidence through observations, conversations, and student products. It also enables teachers to provide ongoing quality descriptive feedback throughout the learning process rather than only at a single point in time. This feedback helps students recognize their strengths, identify next steps, set goals, and reflect on their growth.

SpacesEDU supports assessment for, as, and of learning by giving students opportunities to reflect on their learning, celebrate successes, demonstrate understanding in a variety of ways, and make connections to curricular competencies. At the same time, families gain a meaningful window into classroom learning and student progress, helping strengthen the connection between home and school.

As we begin the SpacesEDU pilot in our four elementary schools, we look forward to learning alongside staff, students, and families. By making learning visible, supporting competency-based learning, strengthening triangulated assessment practices, and encouraging ongoing quality descriptive feedback, SpacesEDU has the potential to celebrate and showcase student growth throughout the school year.

Student Learning - Career & Skill Development

New Dual Credit Policy now in effect for the 2026-2027 school year

Dual credit allows students to take post-secondary courses and earn both post-secondary credits and Grade 12 elective credits.

The new policy is designed to reduce barriers and give students more flexibility to access post-secondary learning.

Key changes include:

- Allowing students to explore post-secondary courses before committing to a post-secondary program or career path
- Allowing students to enroll in dual credit opportunities later in the school year
- Expanding eligibility to Grade 10 students

Summer Workshops

Each year the district curriculum staff facilitate a week of workshops in support of planning for the new year on a myriad of topics. Workshops are open to all teachers in SD60.



Vertical Team Pro-D for Numeracy Instruction

- A vertical team refers to a group of teachers of a particular grade span who collaborate to ensure continuity and coherence in the math curriculum.
- This helps students transition smoothly from one grade to the next, especially at key points like transitioning to a new school.
- Teachers gain insight into how their instruction connects to what comes before and after their grade level.
- This year, Grade 6 and 7 teachers from all schools will be collaborating in vertical teams bridging the transition from Elementary to Middle Years.
- As well, all Grade 3 and 4 teachers will join a vertical team bridging the Primary and Intermediate years.

- This will help foster a shared vision and approach to math instruction and prevent missed numeracy concepts by ensuring each grade builds on the last.

New Teacher Orientation - September 3, 2026

At the beginning of each school year, our HR Department welcomes and orients our new teaching staff to the district and Fort St. John.

New teachers learn about important procedures and supports for them as they begin their career in SD60.

The group also boards a bus to tour all of what Fort St John has to offer.
